AVIA Project Activity and Financial Report 2nd Quarter 2009

AVIA Achievement for the 2nd Quarter

Agnes took two trips to Fort-Dauphin to attend the start (early May) and the closing of the training sessions (early July). In July, the graduation ceremony generated quite a stir in Fort-Dauphin area as to date there was no such a ceremony even for the pastor's graduation. Class of 2009 was baptized "Blessed" as no other class received much support for their training and sending off.

Encouragement in serious time of need and building up for the future, that's what AVIA provided to the school and the church at large.

AVIA has given these catechists the opportunity to be "tentmakers", like Paul in the Book of Acts and Epistles, to avoid being a burden for remote and small churches where support for pastors or evangelists/catechists are practically non-existent. They have now acquired the skills to serve others and to manage their own lives as a testimony to their community.

AVIA, through training sessions and graduation gifts, has turned around a desperate situation in which the students literally struggled for months to provide for their family. Due to AVIA intervention, the synod president announced a significant surge in the number of applicants to the Bible School.

Training Sessions

In total, eight types of training have been conducted as summarized in the following table (Table 1). One of the major training was provided for free by the Population Services International (PSI) organization who aims at reaching out remote villages. They found an almost ideal partner with AVIA/M'tely Bible School where the catechists will be scattered throughout the surrounding area. Of the 30 students trained at the school, 27 graduated and 3 have to re-take classes and exam. Most were sent off to their church district of origin. Lalaina and Agnes have reported on Agnes first trip to FtD, the graduation ceremony, on each type of training, and about an overall evaluation.

Financial Report

This financial report is the most detailed so far for the year. Lalaina always attach petty cash and bank balances on all his financial reports, which allows a regular check on transactions and major expenses engaged for the period. The detailed report is available, but only the abridged version is attached to this document (Table 2 and Table 3). Lynn Butler, GHM accountant, receives on a regular basis the translated copy of the financial report and any preliminary analysis I conduct on the document. She eventually checks/comments all the number and provides a final version on the report. Agnes also provided a detailed report of the amount transferred to SEFAM for personnel expenses.

Worthy of notice is the exchange rate for the successive fund transfer. The following list provides exchange rate fluctuations:

- FtD 1st transfer: \$ 1.00 = Ar. 2,052.79
- FtD 2nd transfer: \$ 1.00 = Ar. 1,942.18
- SEFAM 1st transfer: \$ 1.00 = Ar. 2,006.00
- SEFAM 2nd transfer: \$ 1.00 = Ar. 1,931.00
- Budget exchange rate: \$ 1.00 = Ar. 1,500.00. This increase in exchange rate may give us some room to absorb inflation to some extent.

I discussed with Agnes the project audit that is overdue. At this time, we agreed on having the audit sessions right after the construction project is completed. For this purpose, I recommended that Lalaina be helped by an accounting assistant, even temporarily, because of the amount of work he has to carry out on a daily basis with the construction project. This recommendation will be submitted to the AVIA committee on August 19.

Car Use policy

During the building project group latest meeting (Tom B., John T. and myself), we decided to come up with a vehicle use policy to be inspired by a document from the Dodoma project in Tanzania. As more employees will be hired this semester, it is essential that the car be used for its intended purposes. A monthly mileage of vehicle use was also requested as part of the activity and financial report. As a start, this car can be driven only in the Anosy region.

Building Construction and Renovation

Mr. Jacquelin of MSAADA finally completed a trip to Fort-Dauphin to visit the sites (a trip report is attached) and held a meeting in Tanà with Lalaina and Agnes regarding the construction effort. He is planned to pay few more visits to the site at the start and at finish.

A revised estimate for the building was sent by Mr. Joie of Fort-Dauphin to Mr. Jacquelin and to us. He is the technician recently hired by AVIA with the help of Jacquelin to re-evaluate the first building estimate. The new estimate still falls within the previous total estimate of \$55,000 while exchange rates may give us some advantage with the available local money. Completion of the construction work is set for a maximum of three months from any starting date with the goal of finishing before the start of the rainy season (December). The US management team (Tim, John T., Tom Berkas, and Andry) will be looking and discussing shortly the building estimate document.

The AVIA team on the ground has proven its versatility and ability to conducting training sessions despite the challenging situation. Partnership with a major national/international NGO (PSI) has been initiated and will be sustained over time. A reunion of the graduating catechists is scheduled in the future to evaluate their work and to build upon each other experience regarding village outreach. Another major challenge is awaiting the team for the construction project. A significant assistance from Mr. Jacquelin of MSAADA will hopefully alleviate the burden of the task. The workplan for the remainder of this year is laid out in the attached document (Appendix J).

MISSION REPORT - Taolagnaro
MONDAY, MAY 4 - MONDAY 18 MAY 2009

1. Start-up of the training series:

- All courses are planned: There is a work plan from May to July 2009;
- All the trainers are identified and contacts and discussions have been established;
- The majority of supplies and materials needed for each course are already acquired and on-site in Tanà.
- A term of reference was established for each type of training including the contract signed by the trainer and the regional coordinator (RC);
- Material monitoring is filed and used for each training session, regularly filled by the instructor and the RC;
- An assessment is taken at the end of each week: the trainer gives recommendations and expresses their opinions and their wishes to the students;

Thus:

- This series of training began with training in Cutting and Sewing. As expected, the trainer is Ms. Jeannine. She has a training center located in Taolagnaro fully endorsed by the region and international agencies working in the area. She has extensive experience in both education and practice. All supplies and materials necessary for this training have been acquired from Tanà and shipped on time to Taolagnaro, we started the same day when I arrived Monday afternoon. This training is held every afternoon from Tuesday to Friday, 4 sessions per week.
- At the end of my stay, all 22 participants -students, brides- registered on the 30 students at Manatantely School have been able to finish a skirt, to general satisfaction.

Parallel to the cutting and sewing, culinary training with Mrs Edwige of FAFAFI Taolagnaro is held each Monday afternoon. Therefore, we had two meetings during my stay, during which we learned to prepare fruit jam and juice, ways to conserve the fruits that can be found on site.

2. Training Series Planning:

This planning took into account the date of this ninth Promotion: second week of July 2009, and all sets of training required by students.

It was planned as follows:

Month of MAY:

- 2 weeks for the skirt: 8 sessions
- 2 Weeks for the shirts: 8 sessions
- Fruit conservation training

Month of JUNE: - 4 weeks for sewing training

- Training in bookbinding; local breadmaking, soap making;

3. Transportation during the training:

The RC must attend all training sessions and the car is driven everyday to Manantantely; three Toby shepherds also attended all training with the trainer. The fuel consumption is up around 100,000 Ar per week according to the calculation of RC as a result of the first two weeks of training. However, the allowed monthly amount is 300,000 Ar.

Still on the subject of car, we had to contact someone who works at the registration center (because it currently requires the presence of the owner of the car for the title transfer, which is impossible for us). The filing of the car title transfer is underway.

The RC does not have enough time to do regular maintenance of the car, the training sessions take up an important amount of his time, and the car is used extensively.

4. Office Furniture for PIDV - F / D:

The Office PIDV is equipped with: a cabinet, a living room complete with 2 tables, 2 chairs x 2 places, 1 x 3-seater sofa, 1 table with 1 office and 1 wheelchair table desk / computer. All this only will facilitate the work of RC and the missionaries.

5. Collaboration with other NGOs

- Mrs Edwige who provides culinary training and preservation of fruit is from FAFAFI. She lives in Manantantely and heads the FAFAFI Training Center - Manantantely.

- PSI kindly with students impregnated bednets (90) in which teachers and staff were also able to benefit, and there was also a distribution of water purification kit to replace filter.

- The Dispensary of SALFA within the Toby is finally functional. Dr Rondro is in charge with a collaborator, and they work full time at the Toby currently; the revenue does not even cover their salaries, so the clinic F / D supplements, but everyone hopes that it is a matter of time; that is the time required for the population to know and get used to the service provided.

At the meeting of the health committee which I attended during my mission, we had mutually agreed that the work of daily cleaning of toilets should be provided by the occupants; the shepherds are in agreement, I have seen progress in this direction since my last visit to the Toby;

Now, in collaboration between the local pastors, shepherds, and the health clinic, AVIA must take up the fight against tsipongo (fleas) and other parasites;

- Note also the collaboration with National Office of Nutrition (ONN) who kindly provided the Bible School with Morenga seed and coached the seed planting: Thus, we held a contest to make raised-bed in the school for the student group; the first awards will be given by AVIA, and 2kg of seed and 600 pots are already acquired, students are motivated ;

6. Finances

- We were able to repay the money borrowed from Dr. Sahondra and also Lalaina for what he has advanced to complete the housing office. PIDV owes nothing to anyone.
- Invoices referring to the amount transferred by Dr Julie of SEFAM will be sent to you shortly by scanner.
- It's the same for the financial report prepared by Lalaina;
- Let me also mention that we have the question for the next quarter, especially on wages, we are in the middle of May and I hope that the coming of Rev. Tim solve this problem.

To conclude, I would say that PIDV has begun training activities on the right path. Internal and external collaboration is alive and well. The problems are minimal with the results achieved. We're working toward our goal.

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ACTIVITY REPORT FOR JUNE 2009

I. Background:

The pace and amount of work has been accelerated this month of June, whether the training or the preparation for the graduation of the Class of 2009 at Manantantely Bible School. News from our sites are as follows:

a- **Manantantely Site:**

Partenaire PSI :

Training of AVBC (Village-Based Community Agent) was completed with the PSI (Population Service International) an American NGO. The training was provided by Dr. Baholy from PSI headquarters Antananarivo. The objective of this training was:

- PSI awareness and its role in society
- Learn the art of communication
- Know the fight against malaria
- Know the fight against diarrheal disease
- Learn the technique of family planning
- Know how to operate stock management

The training is done in two groups: the first began on 22 to 24 June and the second wave will be from 13 to 15 July. In fact, the training aims at preparing village outreach coordinator.

Participants : sexe M : 24 ; sexe F : 7

Themes : ACTipal, VIASUR, PILPLAN

Documents and supplies are distributed during the training as well as coffee and tea morning and afternoon.

Partenaire ALT :

Training with ALT (Adrew Lees Trust) has also begun for the Toko Mitsitsy (fuel-saving stove) and theoretical training takes place on 19/06/09 at Manantantely on socio-economic and environmental use of Toko Mitsitsy. Participatory approach was used in this training using series of diagrams that compare users with non-users of the fuel-saving stove.

We also invited people who live in Manantantely in addition to students and wives. The number of participants reached 43.

b- Manambaro Site:

IT training began on 16 June and will last 6 weeks:

The SALFA Dispensary at Fort-Dauphin has also trained two of its personnel with the Manambaro Hospital team.

c- Toby Nenilava Site:

We periodically brought awareness to Toby with the health committee.
The company SODEXO finally installed the large water tank 5,000L to Toby where there is connection with the JIRAMA pipe (local power company).
During the Toby outreach we distributed SUR'EAU to each patient.

II. Problems:

Training schedule for the students was overloaded.
Training with PSI students have claimed compensation for training in place of the sample they were given. Some students got behind sewing training due to attendance problem and had to drop off. Some students have behaved badly towards the trainer.

Manambaro :

The lack of teaching materials is undeniable at Manambaro, the number of computer training is not sufficient, and the training room is small.

The power outage is quite common, especially when using the video projector.

III. Solutions

A dialogue was held with students to fix the problem and behavior change was discussed. We talked with the School Director at Manambaro for better organization of training, preparation for the classroom, and training equipment.

IV. Conclusion

Overall, our training worked well and that the goal of providing students with adequate training and practical life skills was reached.

We together praise God for the completion of the School year and for the graduation of the catechists from the Bible School of Manatantely. We would like to thank you very much for your sustained cooperation.

It is our method at the AVIA to evaluate completed project in order to guide future endeavors. We conducted an evaluation session with the students, their spouses, and the instructors. However, we could not carry out an evaluation with the school teachers and director due to time constraint. We would like to request your understanding that we may share with the church officials our thoughts about the completed training at the Bible School. The motivation is mostly is to seek constant improvements in our cooperation and joint effort for better results.

These what we think are the positive aspects of the completed training sessions :

- All eight training sessions were completed with the students and their respective instructors;
- The catechists and their family were very satisfied with the training they received ;
- They were very grateful for the graduation gifts that will help them get started on self-support at their assigned location work and the health care they received.
- In addition to the catechists, some shepherds from the Neny Lava Toby and the population around the School.

The following aspects may need some improvements :

- The training sessions started quite late in the school year and caused some disturbances with the schedule ;
- This situation impacted the performance of the students in the school and that of the instructors ;
- Communication with the school director was quite limited.

We would like to submit the following recommendations:

- Would it possible to have a limit on the number of students accepted at the school (about 25)

- Could we require a minimum knowledge requirement for the entrance criteria?
- Could we require of the students to pass a medical visit before being admitted at the school?
- Could we include the proposed training session as a part of the school curriculum?

We at AVIA are always available for discussion regarding improvement at the school about practically any aspect.

For the next six months, we will focus on construction/restoration work including that of the director house and some of the students building. We will re-visit the student training next year in 2010.

We would like to reiterate our thanks to the church officials for the prayers dedicated to this work.

REPORT ON GRADUATION CEREMONY
FOR THE CLASS OF 2009 OF THE MANATANATELY BIBLE SCHOOL

DATE : July 12 2009

LOCATION : TANAMBAO Lutheran Church – F/Dauphin

PARTICIPANTS : the School Director ; all instructors ; all students and family; staff members of AVIA (2 ea) ; 11 Pastors from all church districts, Synod representatives ; representatives from the Reformed Church ; many other guests; the trainers.

- The students were wearing the product of their sewing training ; for men: blue pants with white shirts and black tie. For female students: blue dress ; for student spouses : orange dress. Out of the 30 students, 27 graduated et 3 have to repeat their schooling and re-take the exams. A female catechist, Ms. Marie Angèle, was successful at passing the entrance exam at the Bezaha School (Southwest) to continue her study. She received the blessing of the Synod and was granted a full scholarship.
- A gift was given to each trainer (sewing; fruit conservation; traditional bread making and soap ; fuel-saving stove) and the medical doctor who took care of the students.
- Each catechist was given a graduation kit according to the training they completed and their expressed need. We also took into account their attendance record. In fact, three students did not participated in any of the training sessions.
- A list is attached for the graduation kit distribution (Appendix H). In addition, they received a membership booklet for FIVOY, bednets, and SUR'EAU flask. *SUR'EAU is an anti-microbial mix distributed by USAID in times of natural disaster that help the user to disinfect drinking water. One flask works for a 5-gallon bucket.*
- Pictures will be sent to you via Pastor Dennis RAKOTOZAFY who will come to Minnesota to study at the St. Paul seminary.
- Expenses for training and graduation kit are included in the financial report and came in the limit of the allowed amount.
- A graduation reception was held by the School during which the graduation kit was distributed. It was also an opportunity for us to learn about the source of funding for the School : one Sunday per year during which the offering can reach up to 4 millions MGF (\$400) ; sale of local fruits (mango, litchis, coconut) and cash crops (groundnut, rice, and cassava) ; and from overseas the sister-Synod of Illinois and an American family.
- The main issue raised at the graduation was the financial crisis at the School since February 2009;
- An excerpt from the graduation speech of the School director : « These students have endured so much before their graduation, but as we can see today this is a very special class being the only one that benefited from the graduation gift. Even the pastors that

graduated did not receive such a gift. That's why we have chosen the name 'Blessed' for the 2009 class ! ».

- Students who missed the training sessions have notably regretted their choice..
- The School personnel and the Synod representatives would like to convey their deep gratitude to AVIA project.

EVALUATION REPORT OF TRAINING SESSIONS BY INSTRUCTORS

The trainers were also involved in the final evaluation meeting. Unfortunately, they could not all contribute due to their busy schedule. Thus, the following results are from 3 trainers:

- Mrs Jeannine RAZANANIRINA (Sewing)
 - Mrs Pierrette RASOAHANTA (traditional breadmaking, soap)
 - Mrs Edwige RASOANIRINA (Fruit conservation of, cookies, dishes, ...)
1. Question on attendance of participants: the three trainers confirmed the goodwill and interest of participants; particularly for Sewing , the sessions were held until the last day;
 2. All three instructors are satisfied with PIDV regarding transportation, the acquisition of necessary training materials, the relationship with the catechists; Mrs Edwige would have liked a more serious contribution from the catechists during the practice sessions;
 3. Mrs Pierrette is satisfied with the training she provided; the catechists have asked many questions to which she could respond; for the two other trainers, time constraints posed some problems;
 4. In the future, they suggested a longer duration, e.g. 3 or 4 months for sewing; devote special sessions for practices sufficient for all participants; distribute handouts at the end of the session and an evaluation form;
 5. Mrs Jeannine and Pierrette had limited problems during their sessions; for Mrs Edwige, the low level of education of the participants was a problem, as well as their lack of enthusiasm during the practice sessions;
 6. In case the project would still need their services in the future, they are willing to continue collaborate.

REPORT OF TRAINING ON THE FIVOY
MICRO FINANCE

- Date : Friday, July 10th, 2009
 - Place : Bible School of Manantantely
 - Participants : Students and their spouses
 - Trainer : Mr Fredo ANDRIAMANAHIRA – FIVOY
 - Trainer Title : Director of Fivoy Manambaro

Following the meeting with the Director of Fivoy the importance of Micro-Finance in Rural Development, we decided to hold an awareness session on the importance of FIVOY in the rural economy to students of the Bible School of Manantantely.

This session was followed by opening of an account with FIVOY, for each student with an amount of 20,000 Ar upon graduation from the Bible School. Thus, 26 students including 4 couples are beneficiaries of such account. In total, the project has paid an amount of 520,000 Ar.

FIVOY is a Micro Finance Agency. With the opening of an account in hi/her name, the catechist will now both be depositing money in their savings account that can build up their eligibility for a personal loan. This amount allows him/her to make an investment, as necessary, and the rate will be based on these activities as follows:

- Agricultural production: 4%
- Back to school supplies: 5%
- Commercial: 4%
- House construction: 5%
- Accident: 5%

The FIVOY currently exists in several localities F / Dauphin. Also, it is possible to open a project account in the name of all catechists at their village of origin. If their place of employment is different than their village, it is possible to make a transfer. The majority of FIVOY accounts for the students are located at Soanierana and Fort Dauphin.

FIVOY favors women who want to make a loan. Many details were given by the director, but also he cited many specific cases as examples. Many questions have followed the presentation and they were answered clearly.

Repayment of the loan will not exceed three years. The difference between FIVOY with the Bank is that it can make a small loan amount. There are two accounts in FIVOY that is basic membership (Mpikambana tsotra) for the savings account and associate member (Mpikambana tompony) for the rest. Our students are associate members.

Catechists are satisfied as well for explanations for the opening of their account. They are very encouraged by the Project to look into future loans.

DATE: June 22 to 24 (Group 1), July 13 to 15 (Group 2)

SUBJECT: Training students as health extension agents

PARTICIPANTS:

- Group 1: 30 students
- Group 2: 23 students whose wives are catechists students and participants from the villages surrounding the EBM;

TRAINERS: Dr. Tana Baholy PSI (Group 1), Dr. Jimmy PSI Tana (Group 2), Mr Hardy PSI F / Dauphin.

This training falls within the framework of collaboration between the PSI and PIDV Ft / Dauphin. Catechists have been asked to be leaders in health care in the fight against malaria and diarrheal diseases, especially for children under five, in the villages where they will now serve.

As the students were very interested in this training, we also believe that this series will also complement their training. A simple scheme is to be followed to determine the child's illness. The procedure comes from PSI but was endorsed by the Ministry of Health. A prize was offered to those deemed "competent". The participants were 53 among the amount of 226 000Ar was distributed. The amount was taken from the training budget.

These new products to fight against diarrheal diseases and malaria are easy to use at an affordable price for everyone, in addition to the medicated bednets and SUR'EAU anti-microbial mix.

We thought to later offer the same training to the future leader of the AVIA village and to entrust their follow-up by the Bible School students.
